Notes from our Panel Discussion during January Meeting.

A big thank-you to Carolyn Young for putting together the panel discussion on web-sites for our January meeting. Lots of great information. Carolyn has put together notes from that discussion for your convenience.

It is said that there are entire worlds in the arts industry that most of us know nothing about. If you were not at The Weatherford Art Association's meeting on Monday, you missed a fascinating glimpse into one of those worlds, building an art business online. The WAA hosted a panel discussion featuring five working member artists, Carol L Acedo, Sarah Clawson, Kathy Cunning, Jack Eidson, Jerry Shidal and moderator Carolyn Bernard Young. As Carolyn Young noted, "We have all slain the dragon of building an on-line website. Our purpose is to tell you what we've learned from that experience." There is a dizzying array of online platforms, some are better suited for the novice, and some are for only the tech savvy. Each type of platform has different levels of cost for creation, a domain and monthly and/or yearly charges.

A few highlights from the discussion:

 $\textbf{Jerry Shidal} - \underline{\textbf{www.JShidal.faso.com}} \textbf{ -}$

Platform: Faso.com

Jerry has had a website on Faso, an art marketing platform based in San Antonio, for about 8 years. He has an unlimited portfolio of images for a monthly fee and took advantage of a one-month free trial.

Sarah Clawson – <u>www.SarahClawson.com</u> - Platform: Wix

Sarah chose Wix because she has maximum control of her website on this platform, with no barriers for customers getting quick access to her site. Wix also features over 80 templates to choose from and the product price, tax and shipping cost are all broken out at point of sale. Also, the traffic on her site is observable down to the location of the client and what page they are looking at.

Carol loves this platform, which she calls "a total set of artist's tools for setting up an art business", tracking inventory, sales reports,

invoicing capabilities, QR code creation, even live webinars and guides for pricing

Kathy said the initial investment was \$999 for two years to get set up and \$450 a year after that at the level of she purchased. Which meant she did all the building with the company's help. She said it is a big learning curve, but she feels having a site is important for entering shows and teaching.

Platform: WordPress

Jack has mixed feelings about WordPress, especially in the building of the site. It can be awkward and confusing learning the language of the interface, with the cost going up as you add plug-ins and images.

Carolyn agrees WordPress is not for the novice, it took about six weeks to build her site. The upside is great features, like an essential e-mail list and regular newsletters to keep clients informed. Also, the ability to let clients book appointments to visit her studio.

The bottom line is that if you have the money for a startup, the energy, a laptop and the commitment to building an art business, there is an on-line platform out there for you.

We encourage you to explore each of these artists' websites and explore the online tools that are right for you. WAA has 2 FACEBOOK accounts:



Darla Bostick's Art Adventure May 2023


Each year a small group joins Darla Bostick for her Art Adventure Abroad to a new destination. Visit the Umbrian Region of northern Italy and stay at La Romita!





Are Cadmium Pigments in Artist Paints Harmful?

On recent trips to both Hobby Lobby and Michael's, a search revealed that popular artist paint pigments containing cadmium are no longer on their shelves. Both the Master's Touch Thick Body Acrylic line (at Hobby Lobby) and the Liquitex Professional Heavy Body line (at Michael's) no longer include the popular paint colors cadmium yellow light, cadmium red light, and cadmium orange are no longer on the shelves. So this raises the question as to why? A little research on the internet located a few interesting articles. Their sources are cited below.

The Danger (Extracted from a report dated 2014) "Artists' palettes might be about to change forever. A proposed Europe-wide ban on cadmium pigments found in acrylic, oil, and watercolor paints could be enforced in the next two years, the <u>Art Newspaper</u> initially reported.

Sweden submitted a restriction report to the European Chemical Agency last year. The report claims that cadmium, a heavy metal, is spreading over agricultural land via sewage sludge. It suggests that this is a result of artists rinsing their brushes in the sink. Therefore, the toxic substance could be polluting the food chain and increasing the risk of cancer and skeletal fracture due to the

substance's <u>dramatic</u>, <u>negative effect on</u> <u>calcium levels</u> in the bones, among other diseases. Due to these potentially harmful externalities, the EU launched an investigation as to whether the substance should be banned.

The European Chemical Agency will make a decision next December. And if the restriction goes ahead, it could have deleterious effects on the future of art. Cadmium is one of the main components used to create bright and intense pigments in red, yellow, and brown hues. It was discovered around 1820 and first commercialized for artists' use by the mid 1840s. Claude Monet's famous yellow hues, for example, were painted with cadmium pigments."

Safety Tips

"However, during the paint-making process the pigment is fused with sulfides and coated in the particular medium's binder (oil, acrylic, gouache or watercolor). This process renders the cadmium insoluble in water, and therefore the human body. We can't absorb it. So no gloves are necessary. And cadmium paints don't give off any dust or fumes, so no worries about inhalation either. I've just recently spoken again with a paint manufacturer who said that the paint-making process makes cadmium colors safe in oil, acrylic, gouache and watercolor.

With that said, you DO need to use extra caution if you're sanding dry cadmium paint or sprayapplying. If that's you, make sure you wear a NIOSH dust respirator to eliminate the chance of inhaling cadmium particles. (Or any other harmful particles / dust.) The same advice applies if you work at all with dry cadmium or other pigments. (For example, if you like to make your own paint.) Also, please avoid pouring your dirty brushcleaning water or solvent down the drain or onto the ground. This can introduce heavy metals like cadmium into the watershed, possibly creating problems downstream. It's recommended that you soak up your dirty water / dirty solvent with paper towels then throw them away in your studio trash."

Manufacturers Are Now Offering Cadmium-Free Alternatives

It appears that several manufactures are presently offering cadmium-free paints. These include Liquitex, Winsor & Newton, Utrecht, and Rembrandt.

"These days, some conscientious paint manufacturers like Liquitex and Utrecht (scroll down to see the cadmium-free paints) have begun to create new non-toxic versions of those colors—for example, a color that looks and performs almost exactly the same as Cadmium Yellow but contains no cadmium. The non-cadmium paints work so similarly to the cadmium paints that artists in a test weren't able to tell the difference!"

What Will You Decide?

Are these reported dangers of cadmium in your paints sufficient for the artist to abandon cadmium colors from their palette? That decision seems to still be up to the artists. However, the

free colors to their cadmium counterparts, and the results were clear. In addition to using a product with fewer health and environmental concerns, the majority of respondents felt the new paints equaled or exceeded the quality and performance of the natural cadmium colors."

fact that at least four major manufacturers are now offering cadmium-free alternatives and that the two largest retailers of artist painting supplies no longer have the cadmium products on their shelves ar strong arguments to make the switch - at least long enough to try these newer products and give them an honest evaluation. If they are just as good, shouldn't we want to use them?
